Hazardous Weather Training

In Scouting, we do not compromise the safety of our youth, volunteers, and employees. Safety is a value that must be taught and reinforced at every opportunity. We are all responsible and must hold each other accountable to provide a safe environment for all participants.

Effective the week of December 2, 2024 Hazardous Weather training is now required for all "direct contact" leaders and will be reflected in unit training reports. Hazardous Weather training expires every two years and is required to be fully trained in the following positions:

- Cub Scouts Cubmaster, Assistant Cubmaster, Den Leader, Assistant Den Leader, Tiger Den Leader, Webelos Den Leader, Assistant Webelos Den Leader
- Scouts BSA Scoutmaster, Assistant Scoutmaster
- Venturing Advisor, Associate Advisor
- Sea Scouting Skipper, Mate
- Exploring Advisor, Associate Advisor

Hazardous Weather training is available at my.scouting.org. The course focuses on how to identify and respond to dangerous weather conditions like heat, flooding, lightning, and severe storms, ensuring the safety of Scouts during outdoor activities. It is critical for all Scout leaders to be prepared for potentially life-threatening weather situations and take proper precautions when potential hazardous weather is near.

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Remember the Scout motto - "Be Prepared". It is important to "Be Prepared" for any type of weather during a Scout outing. Plan in advance for the possibility of bad weather, knowing tornadoes, lightning, hail, flash flooding and heavy rain can happen at any time. The threat of severe weather doesn't always mean you need to cancel your weekend camping trip. However, you should take precautions to avoid incidents!

Five Steps for an Open House

Open houses are a great way to attract new members to troops, crews, and ships. They all follow basically the same format, with a message tailored to the specific unit. We will use a troop open house as an example.

There are five steps to a successful open house:

- 1. School rally. Present a fun rally to 5th and 6th graders. With the school administration's consent, plan an interactive demonstration of a Scouting activity and distribute a high-adventure interest survey to the students. Alternatively, ask the school to distribute the surveys.
- 2. Send the parents of interested youth a personal invitation to the troop open house. Follow up on the contacts you made at the school rally by inviting the parents and their children to an open house.
- 3. Follow up with a call. Ask if any of the family members have a Scouting background and answer any questions they may have.
- 4. Host a troop open house for the youth and their parents. Have an agenda and the troop's calendar available. Ensure the Scouts have fun, and their parents get their questions answered. Provide refreshments. Scouts can make the refreshments!
- 5. Organize an activity to involve new Scouts right away. This is the key to keeping the new scouts in the program.

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Introduction to Leadership Skills

Young people in Scouting have many opportunities to grow, learn, develop and prepare themselves for their future. One of the ways Scouting provides these opportunities is through youth holding different leadership positions. The Introduction to Leadership Skills (ILST) training for troops helps give youth tools to succeed in their leadership roles by focusing on these three areas:

- 1. Troop Organization
- 2. Tools of Leadership
- 3. Leadership and Teamwork

Scouts who complete this training, can go on to learn even more at National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT) ILST gives Scouts in troop leadership an opportunity to get to know each other and build relationships and to help make their unit successful. An ILST training should be run after every unit election.

ILST training can be held over a weekend, a single day or broken up into different days based on the training modules. If your troop has not run an ILST before, adult leaders can contact the district training chair to discuss how to hold the training for the first time.

Ask and encourage your experienced youth leaders to help run the event alongside adult leadership. A youth led ILST will help Scouts see themselves in important roles in their troop. For those helping to teach and present modules, give youth enough time to practice and be comfortable with the information.

Make sure to take breaks during the training and check in with participants during the breaks. Breaks allow participants to absorb more of the skills they are learning. Encourage them to think and be reflective during the training, it is a resource to improve the troop and its youth leaders by helping them to develop leadership skills which they can apply to Scouting and their everyday life.



Location: Sunol Regional Wilderness

Starting point: Visitor Center

Distance: 3.5 miles

Time: Allow about 3 hours

Grade: Moderate

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Cross-over Ceremonies

Consider ideas that visually represent the transition from Cub Scouts to Scouts BSA, often using a **symbolic bridge**, incorporating elements like **lighting candles** with specific meanings, having the Scouts physically cross a designated area, or even incorporating a "challenge" to demonstrate their preparedness for the next level, all while including speeches from both Cub Scout and Scout leaders to welcome the new Scouts.

Elements to Include

Physical Bridge:

- Build a simple bridge structure for the Scouts to walk across, symbolizing their transition.
- Utilize a natural bridge in a park or outdoor setting.
- Decorate the bridge with Scout-related symbols or colors.

Ceremonial Lighting:

- Light candles representing different aspects of Scouting, with each AOL Scout lighting a candle as they cross.
- Use colored candles with specific meanings, like blue for Cub Scouts and yellow for Scouts BSA.

Speeches and Recognition:

- Cubmaster addresses the Pack and highlights the accomplishments of the AOL Scouts.
- Scoutmaster welcomes the new Scouts to the troop, emphasizing the challenges and opportunities ahead.
- Individual AOL Scouts may be recognized for their achievements.

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Ceremony Ideas

Trail of Challenges: Set up a series of mini-challenges representing different Scouting skills that AOL Scouts must complete before crossing the bridge, demonstrating their preparedness.

Campfire Ceremony: Gather around a campfire with the Cub Scout pack on one side and the Scout troop on the other, with AOL Scouts crossing between to join the troop.

Scout Oath Recitation: Have the AOL Scouts recite the Scout Oath together as they cross the bridge.

Symbolic Handshake: Each AOL Scout receives a special handshake from a Scout leader as they enter the troop.

Nature-themed Crossover: Incorporate natural elements like rocks, sticks, or a small river into the ceremony, depending on the location.

Reflection Time: Include a brief moment of quiet reflection for AOL Scouts to think about their journey from Cub Scouts to Scouts BSA.

Order of the Arrow Ceremonies



Your pack can request the Order of the Arrow to conduct the cross-over ceremony.

Note that costumes are no longer allowed.
